Most Sundays, children and youth will go to programming just for them after the Story! On "All Ages Sundays", children and youth stay in the Sanctuary and enjoy in a worshipful and celebratory space with no religious education programming. Rugs in the back and front of the Sanctuary invite children to color, read, listen, and play while also enjoying the song, movement, and prayer of a UU community. We often think about meditation, religious rituals, or pilgrimages as spiritual practices. Yet the journey of parenting also offers us opportunities to grow spiritually as we embrace change every day.

TODAY AT EAST SHORE

Religious Education for Children & Youth (In Person): Core programs for children and youth run during worship this year.

- ◇ Little Uus Ages 1-5. Focus on the early stories, songs, and spiritual practices of Unitarian Universalism, a loving faith tradition. Start in the Sanctuary for the beginning of worship, and then go to their class with RE Volunteers. Parents/caregivers pick up your Little Uu by 11:45am.
- ◇ Spirit Makers Ages 5-9 + Visitors! Focus on the early stories, songs, and spiritual practices of Unitarian Universalism, a loving faith tradition. Parents/caregivers pick up your Spirit Makers by 11:45am.
- ◇ Grades 4-6 OWL - start directly in class. Designed to help children ages nine through twelve to gain the knowledge, life principles, and skills they need to understand and express their sexuality in holistic, life-enhancing ways. Advanced registration required.
- ◇ Grades 7-8 OWL - start directly in class. A cornerstone comprehensive sexuality education program based in values where teens explore decision making, body image, and other life issues in a safe environment. Advanced registration required.
- ◇ Y@ES Youth Group - For ages 14-19 We take a field trip to Snoqualmie to snowshoe. Meet up in the lower parking lot at East Shore. All are welcome! RSVP to education@esuc.org for gear and a ride!
